

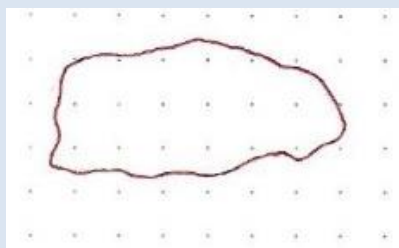


CBJ DRAWING LESSONS

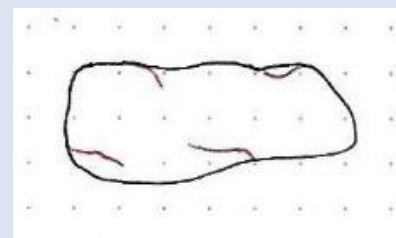
#D19-9 "Rocks"

DIRECTIONS: P-I-E (Pencil, Ink, Erase) First use PENCIL, Draw the Red ink in each step. Then INK all lines, ERASE Pencil. COLOR

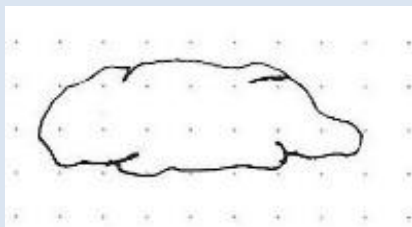
#1. In pencil, lightly draw an oval blob with a slightly wider base and a gently lumpy outline.



#2. In 3-4 places, spaced out around the edges pencil in short lines as cracks. Try to place them where the outline is indented and not too evenly spaced.



#3. As you ink the outline, dip in a bit at the intersections of the edge cracks. Don't make sharp indents, just gently curves.



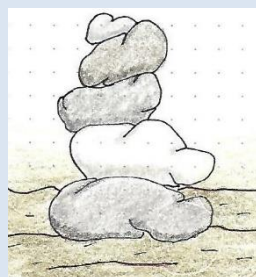
#4. After inking, erase pencil.

#5. Use natural colors, a dark and middle tone or a middle and light tone to color your rocks. Use the darker shade along the bottom and along the cracks.

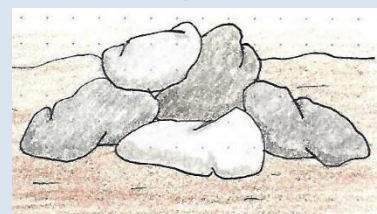


#6. If you are including more than one rock in your scene, use different colors for various rocks.

#7. If you are using your rocks to make a stack, draw from the bottom up and reduce the size as you move upward.



#8. When making a pile of rocks, pencil in a base of 2-3 larger rocks that are overlapped. Add a couple of smaller rocks atop those. Ink the rocks that are more forward first, then move backward in the stack.



#9. To make rocks appear to recede into the distance, reduce the size as they move further back.



#10. A rock in water will appear to have a flat bottom as the water forms a level there. Drawing some concentric ovals around the front and sides will enhance the appearance of water.
